Patient Advocate/Visitation volunteers visit VNA patients in area care facilities on a weekly or biweekly basis. Volunteers provide companionship and conversation, as well as support for the patient in regard to his/her healthcare.

Project Next Step volunteers assist individuals in transition from homelessness to independence. Volunteers pick up and deliver donated items, such as kitchen supplies, cleaning supplies and linens, to individuals and families beginning the "next step" in their lives.

Hospice Volunteers

Hospice is dedicated to providing compassionate care to patients facing terminal illness. Volunteers help our team by offering companionship, as well as caregiver relief.

Volunteers need to complete 16 hours of hospice training prior to being assigned to an individual's home, nursing facility, or Hospice House. Hospice volunteers may also choose to assist in bereavement or clerical duties. In-services are provided as ongoing support.

VNA Teens

VNA Teens (14 years and older) volunteer their time making a difference in the lives of hospice and nursing home patients. Teens decide what they would like to do, such as group projects, visiting patients, recording a patient's life history, or computer projects. Teens fit their volunteering into their own schedules, and receive hospice training to assure they are comfortable with their volunteer experience.

Flu Clinic Volunteers
